October's Board Meeting Highlights:

Projects/Activities Report:

Kokanee Karnival: This year we had nine classes and about 225 students at Fall River Hatchery. One class was unable to attend because of lack of transportation. Next year first time presenters will be invited to the Monday morning session to listen to someone who has given the presentation before

Sept. 23 Outing: This was poorly attended.

Interpretive Signs: Bruce Stencil reported that the old Old Wagon Train sign by circle 11 will be removed. A former resident of Sunriver has requested the sign.

Crooked River Fish Collection: We have been requested to help our OSU Graduate Scholarship recipient collect fish on Oct. 4, 5, and 11,12. We will make Oct. 11 a club outing.

Old Business:

Nomination Committee: Marv reported that progress is being made in filling the positions open for next year. A full slate of candidates will be presented at the Nov. Board Meeting.

Christmas Dinner Auction Items: Jack reported that items are still needed. A friend Of Bob Kempf's has agreed to create a work of stained glass for the auction. He would set a minimum price for the object. We would keep anything over his price. If we did not get the minimum bid the artist would take it back at no obligation to the club. It was decided to try this idea.

October's Meeting Speaker—A Scientists' View of Deschutes River Basin:

The naturalist is a scientist of the outdoors.

A fly fisherman will step from the bank into the river, somewhat aware that the shoreline he has just left is partially eroded. A naturalist on the other hand will stand on the bank and realize how the intrinsic temporal and spatial variability of the flow regime, sediment supply, bank materials, channel platform and riparian vegetation interact to create channel morphologies that vary longitudinally.

One thing the fly fisherman has over the naturalist is he gets more fishing done.

The fly fisherman and the naturalist are all looking at the same thing but the naturalist is looking for something, looking for answers that will explain how the geology and hydrology evolved into its present state. Millions of years and generations of people have both impacted upon our region. Changes that nature has made to the rivers over the centuries and recent human encounter have sculptured our domain. The naturalist will learn from that past and present solutions to our present problems.

What we see as 150 inch snow base with 8" of fresh power at Mt. Bachelor, the naturalist sees as snow melt that will fill our rivers and lakes in not a single year but water that flow into those water bodies 10 or 20 years from today. Looking back in time the naturalist studies the effects of the glaciation of the headwaters during the pleistocene period and the deglaciation during the holocene age. Our landscape has and will always change with the naturalist being a historian of those changes.

Bretagne Dow-Hygelund (pronounced Brateen) is a naturalist at the Sunriver Nature Center. On October 16 she will be speaking to the Sunriver Anglers Club. Her topic will be concerning the Deschutes River Basin, from the eyes of a naturalist but with words we can understand.

The Deschutes River Basin is part of the larger Columbia River Basin and includes all land drained by the Deschutes River and its tributaries. From the Cascades to the Eastern Cascades, Northern Basin and Range, Blue Mountains and Columbia Plateau, the basin is 10,500 square miles or almost seven times the size of Glacier National Park. This is our National Park, we see it every day and so does the naturalist.
