PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Greetings fellow anglers and welcome to the warmer weather of March. Spring officially begins on March 22 although the early signs of it are already beginning to show. The days are getting longer, trees are beginning to bud, and the ice is starting to thaw on the lakes.

I hope you were able to check out the Central Oregon Sportsmen's Show and the Northwest Fly Tyer and Fly Fishing Expo this month. Both of these were excellent shows and should have generated a lot of interest and enthusiasm about fishing this year.

March is a good time to prepare for the coming fishing season. Make sure your boat, pontoon boat, float tube, waders and other equipment that you will need to access your fishing spots are all in good working order. It can be frustrating to arrive at your fishing destination only to find that the motor won't start, your pontoon boat won't hold air, or that your waders leak.

I'm also trying to stock up on those favorite fly patterns so that I'll have them available when I set out on a fishing trip. I usually have some time in March to tie flies in a relaxed setting. This helps me to avoid scrambling around at the last minute trying to tie flies. Those last minute flies are usually tied in a rushed and sloppy manner.

This month's meeting will feature Jim Wigington, a professional hydrologist and fisherman who will discuss how climate and geology affect fishing in our local streams and rivers. His talk should provide us with more information about the Deschutes River Basin and may give us greater insight about this productive fishing river. I'm looking forward to learning more about the relationship between climate, geology and fishing.

We are preparing for two of our major volunteer events for the youngsters of the area, the Kokanee Karnival Spring Angling Clinic and Free Fishing Day at Caldera Springs pond. The Kokanee Karnival Clinic will take place at Shevlin Park on April 25, 26, 28 and 29 and May 2 and 3. The

Sunriver Anglers club is responsible for preparing lunches for the kids, and we will need volunteers to help on these days. This task will only take a few hours and is a lot of fun. If you are interested, you can also help the kids at the Shevlin Park fishing pond in the afternoon.

Free Fishing Day will be held on Saturday, June 4. This is a major community event and typically attracts about 200 children. We will need a lot of help on this day at the sign-in desk, fishing equipment table, display booths, fishing pond, and cooking grill. Both of these events are great fun for the kids and the adult volunteers. There will be sign-up sheets for each of these events at this month's meeting. Please sign up for either or both of these events. You will find both of them to be rewarding experiences.

On May 10, there will be a community outreach meeting at the SHARC in Sunriver for the Upper Deschutes River Basin Study. This study is looking at future water supply and demand in view of climate change, how the Deschutes River system may be operated in the future, and possible options to address future water supply and demand. This will be a chance for you to learn more about the future of the upper Deschutes River and to ask questions about topics that are of interest or concern to you. We will have more information and details about this meeting in the next newsletter.

Dues – we recently sent via e mail the 2016 membership renewal notice. Dues are \$30 a year and we look forward to continued membership.

Holiday Party – we will have a small silent auction and raffle at our December 14 party at Crosswater Club. Please consider setting aside items for the event, such as tying flies for lakes and streams, certificates for golf, dining, fishing trips, etc. - items that you would want to bid on. Last year we raised nearly \$2,000 to support our conservation efforts. Let Jerry know what you have, thanks.

Club Meetings

March 17th Anglers Meeting: Snow, Rain, and Rock: How Climate and Geology Shape Oregon Trout Streams

As of the first of February 2016, over 350 inches of snow has fallen on Mt. Bachelor this winter. Snow has covered the ground in Sunriver since Thanksgiving. Portland had the wettest December in recorded history. Lots of moisture this year, very different from the 2014 – 2015 snow seasons. Last year in January and February, Sunriver golfers were enjoying rounds of golf on the Woodlands golf course.

How is this year's weather pattern going to affect our Central Oregon fishing? How will it affect the fishing streams and rivers west of the Cascades? Will there be a difference? Much of

Central Oregon consists of volcanic soil and rock, while the fertile soil and bedrock of the Willamette Valley is very different.

How will this year's weather affect the State of Oregon's fishing in May, in August? Does the geology of the area that you love to fish affect the fish habitat differently throughout the angling season?

To hear the answers to these questions and much more, attend the March 17th Sunriver Anglers Club Meeting at the SHARC, starting at 6:45pm. Our guest speaker is Jim Wigington, a retired research hydrologist for the US Environmental Protection Agency. He is a courtesy faculty member from the EPA to the Oregon State University Institute for Water and Watershed. As a fly fisherman for over forty years, Jim has educated his fishing partners about the geology of the streams as they cast for those elusive trout and steelhead. Currently Jim resides in Redding, California and fishes the great angling streams and rivers of Northern California.

Jim is a certified fly casting instructor with the Federation of Fly Fishers. He will be teaching a fly casting class at this year's Northwest Fly Tyer and Fly Fishing Expo in Albany on March 11 and 12. This expo is a great annual event. For each of three sessions a day, there will be over seventy fly tyers demonstrating their skills. All you have to do is pull up a chair and learn. Also during the expo, there are fly casting demos and classes as well fishing and fly tying classes. For more information, check it out at www.nwexpo.com.

Jim earned his PHD in Environmental Science and Engineering at Virginia Tech in 1981. He uses both his education and passion for fly fishing to help the angling community around the United States. Jim is currently working with US Environmental Protection Agency to help create a process to protect one of the world's most valuable salmon fisheries in Bristol Bay, Alaska. It is at risk from a proposed mine at the Pebble deposit.

This year's fly fishing outings schedule is being finalized. Come to the meeting to find out the latest updates on Sunriver Anglers Club activities.

Monroe Reservoir – Private Lake Fishing May 3 and 10, 2016



Monroe Reservoir is an 8 acre private lake less than 2 hours from Sunriver. Sunriver Anglers has two days reserved on **May 3 and 10** (Tuesdays). Cost is \$150/day. KNOW YOUR LOCAL FLY GUY

This is the first in a short series of articles to acquaint you with the fly shop owners in this area. The local fly shops are the backbone of the fly-fishing scene here in Central Oregon. Their owners are people who are passionate about fishing and the fish resources of the area's lakes and streams. They are also very knowledgeable about the fishing in all of the local waters and can provide valuable and timely information about the angling locations, fishing techniques, and flies that will work for you.

Fred Foisset

“Flyshop, Fred.” Those are often the first words you’ll hear when you call The Hook Flyshop here in Sunriver. Flyshop Fred is Fred Foisset, co-owner of The Hook/Cascades Guides and Outfitters which is located in the Sunriver Village Mall. Fred is originally from the Catskill region of upstate New York, the birthplace of American fly fishing. Fred started his fishing in the famous trout streams of the Catskills at the age of 8 and this kindled his lifelong interest in fishing. When he was 12 years old, Fred made a list of all the fish he wanted to catch and carried that list with him for many years. He’s caught many of the fish on that list and is working to complete it.

After finishing school, Fred’s wanderlust led him to Key West, Florida. He lived there for five years and became well acquainted with tarpon, snook and other saltwater fish. He next moved to San Diego and chased the many saltwater fish species in southern California. Like many of us, Fred came to Central Oregon on vacation and decided that he needed to settle here to live. After moving to this area in the late 1980s, Fred worked at the High Desert Museum and began guiding on the weekends. He first guided for Deschutes River Outfitters and fished the lower Deschutes River and many of the lakes in the region.

In 1994, Fred opened The Hook in the Sunriver Village with Bob Bates. The Hook is a full service fly shop that has a large selection of fly-fishing equipment, flies, and fly-tying equipment. Cascades Guides and Outfitters offers professionally guided fishing trips on many of the lakes and streams in our local area. Fred is a certified casting instructor and teaches casting lessons to individuals.

Fred is also an avid fly tyer who ties flies for several hours every day. He is an innovative fly tyer who has developed a number of effective flies based on his observations of the fish food items and their behaviors. Some of Fred’s better known flies include Fred’s Callibaetis nymph, the TSW (ask Fred what this stands for), and the hover dragon.

In general, Fred thinks that the future of fly fishing is promising. He believes that the recent fishing regulation changes will be good for both the fishing and the fish resources in our local waters. Fred has observed that more women and younger people are taking up fly fishing which he believes will help ensure that this sport will remain popular. However, Fred sees a need to educate the newcomers to the tradition and etiquette of fly fishing and fishing in general so that we all can continue to enjoy this fine sport.

SALEM, Ore. – As families venture to the outdoors this spring, the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife reminds parents that youths between the ages of 12 and 17 need a license if they plan to hunt, fish or shellfish. [Kids now need fishing license at age 12](#)

SALEM, Ore – Aquatic invasive species [watercraft inspection stations](#) open March 1 at the Ashland Port of Entry on northbound I-5 and March 3 at the Ontario rest area on northbound I-84. Watercraft inspection stations in Lakeview, Klamath Falls and Gold Beach open in mid-May.

All vehicles carrying motorized or non-motorized boats, including canoes, kayaks, paddleboards and sailboats must stop. Motorists are alerted to inspection stations by large orange “Boat Inspection Ahead” signs followed by “Inspection Required for All Watercraft.”

“It’s very important that people stop at these stations and get their boats inspected. It’s our first line of defense in keeping aquatic invasive species such as mussels, plants and snails out of Oregon and the Pacific Northwest,” said Rick Boatner, Invasive Species Coordinator.

“Stopping for a watercraft inspection takes just five to 10 minutes in most cases. You’re protecting Northwest waters and preventing yourself from possibly receiving a \$110 fine for bypassing a check station,” Boatner said.

Invasives such as [zebra and Quagga mussels](#) can be difficult to spot – they range in size from microscopic to up to two inches, and attach themselves to many areas on boats that are hard to see. They can also live as long as 21 days out of water. [New Zealand mud snails](#) are also tiny, just three to six millimeters long and easily attach themselves to boots, waders and fishing gear.

In 2015, ODFW technicians inspected 12,954 watercrafts and intercepted 12 with Quagga or zebra mussels and 270 with other types of aquatic invasives, such as Eurasian milfoil and brown mussels. Watercraft with Quagga or zebra mussels came from Lake Powell, Lake Mead, Lake Havasu, Lake Erie, Lake Michigan, Lake Ontario and the Fox River in Illinois. “The program is working,” Boatner said. “Everyone who boats needs to make sure their boat is cleaned, drained and dried before putting in at another water body. Anglers should be vigilant about cleaning all their gear.”

Cougars are one such species where human/predator interactions seem dramatic, but are nonetheless extremely rare. Fly-Tying Corner

I like the damsel hatch. It occurs mid-day on most of our local lakes in later June and is characterized by a very splashy rise form as trout take damsels swimming just below the

surface film. Damsels look to find sticks, tules, anchor ropes, or any other object that enables them to crawl out of the water to hatch. They often swim just below the surface for some distance looking for these items latch onto. It is during this surface swimming action that the damsel is the most vulnerable to trout. The damsel nymph coloration matches the color of the environment that these insects live, which ranges from tan to a deep olive.

This month's pattern is the Lion's Mane Damsel, which is a pattern that I have used with good success casting towards rise forms and/or surface structure. It is stripped back in short strips on a dry line fishing the fly very shallow under the surface film. The name Lion's Mane Damsel is attributable to the wound marabou around the eyes that give the fly its characteristic lion's mane look. Offer long pauses during the retrieve. Trout will often take during these pauses. The design of the Lion's Mane Damsel is simple; it features a long wispy tail to mimic the undulating motion of the natural. As you can see in the picture above, the tail contains a small drop of UV resin, which offers a hinge point on the tail and can help further the swimming motion of the natural. Give the following pattern recipe a try during your early summer damsel hatches on a favorite local lake.

Lion's Mane Damsel Pattern Recipe:

Hook:	TMC 5212 size 10-12 or similar
Thread:	Olive Brown to match Marabou
Abdomen:	Tan to Olive Marabou with very long fibers
Rib:	Red or Copper Wire
Thorax:	Olive Brown to match Marabou
Eyes:	Black Plastic Bead Chain Eyes
