July Speaker-


The Sunriver Anglers are fortunate to have John Shewey, Editor-in-Chief of Northwest Fly Fishing Magazine speak at its July meeting.

Northwest Fly Fishing Magazine is the premier magazine for our sport with thoughtful articles and beautiful photographs of the fish and waters closest to our home. Shewey will speak at the club meeting on Thursday, July 20, 2017 with a social time beginning at 6:30 PM and the meeting starting at 7 PM. The title of Shewey's presentation is Confessions of a Swinger: Fly Fishing for Summer – Run Steelhead.

John Shewey started fly fishing very early and bought his first fly rod at age 7 earning money from his chores. His father taught him as a youngster where they lived in St. Anthony Idaho, close to the Henry's Fork. He was also able to fish the waters near Island Park Idaho when he traveled there with his father. Later the family moved to the Pocatello area and young John would hike 1 mile nearly every day to fish on Mink Creek. He moved to Oregon later in his youth and then attended the University of Oregon where he obtained a degree in journalism. He has lived in the Bend area for 10 years so he knows our waters very well.

Early in his 30 year career he was a freelance editor of the magazine and in 2012 he became editor in chief of Northwest Fly Fishing, Southwest Fly Fishing and Eastern Fly Fishing magazines. He has also written nearly 20 books with his latest book being Classic Steelhead Flies. Shewey is responsible for the content of these magazines and the planning and procuring of articles and writers.

The magazines are excellent at portraying the visual beauty of our sport and its surroundings. He is rightfully proud of some of the innovation of the magazine such as photographing fish in a manner that impresses on the reader that the fish should be kept in or near the water for successful catch and release. Much credit for the magazine's visual appeal also goes to Creative Director John Luke. I found it very



interesting as to how the writers and waters are selected for the articles and what is expected for the writing and photograph quality. His presentation will be about his main fly fishing passion, which is pursuing summer run steelhead.

Shewey relates that, "The art and passion that enshrouds steelhead fly fishing afflicts countless devotees, forming an addiction that borders on religion." He will discuss various techniques for taking the ultimate game fish and the local rivers to fish. Shewey has a keen interest in the history of this sport and the flies used which will also be discussed. Even if you do not fly fish for steelhead, you will enjoy this casual presentation rich in beautiful photography, focused on entertainment, and not over-technical minutiae.

John Shewey has a wealth of information and insight about our sport and its future. In interviewing him, I found him to be very informative and thoughtful about the issues we face with fishing pressure, fishing ethics, wild fish v. hatchery fish, dwindling steelhead populations and related legal challenges.

The secluded 150 acre lake, located 40 miles east of Klamath Falls in the beautiful Langell Valley (about a 3 hour drive).

Details:

Date: October 10, 11 and 12, 2017 (Tuesday – Thursday). The lake closes July one and reopens Oct. 10 so the fish should be hungry!

Minimum 8 anglers. Seven have signed up as of 7/6.
Maximum number of anglers is 16.

Toilets: several outhouses

Rods: minimum is a 6 wt. Leaders and Tippetts 3x and above:

Flies: TBD.

Rainbows: up to 10 to 17 pounds. Nets: large, large, and large.

ODFW asks anglers to give region's steelhead a helping hand

CLACKAMAS, Ore. – Facing some of the lowest steelhead returns on record, the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife has already curtailed steelhead fishing seasons throughout the Columbia River basin by adopting rolling season closures, reduced bag limits, and a night angling closure for all species.

Additionally, ODFW is asking anglers to further help the region's steelhead by adopting ODFW's best handling practices when they're out on the water this summer.

"Positive voluntary efforts may reduce the necessity for future mandatory regulations," said Tucker Jones, ODFW's manager of Ocean Salmon and Columbia River fisheries. "If a person happens to intercept a wild steelhead, or any steelhead during a retention closure period for that matter, it is imperative that they do their utmost to ensure its survival by using best handling practices."

ODFW lists best handling practices on Page 13 of the 2017 Oregon Sport Fishing Regulations. These practices include:

- Use barbless hooks (even where not required)
- Use tackle strong enough to bring your fish in quickly
- Land fish as quickly and carefully as possible
- Avoid removing the fish from the water
- If taking a photo, cradle the fish at water level and quickly take the picture
- Remove hooks quickly and gently while keeping the fish under water
- Use long-nosed pliers or hemostats to back out a hook
- If a fish is hooked deeply, cut the line near the hook
- Revive fish (point them into slow current or move them back and forth until gills are working)

- When possible, let the fish swim out of your hands
- Fish when it's cool out – likely early in the morning or late in the afternoon – fishing is better and stress on fish is less.

Upriver summer steelhead forecasts are very low this year at approximately 119,000, compared to 5- and 10-year average actual returns of 236,000 and 315,000, respectively. Wild upriver summer steelhead forecasts are low as well, with a forecast return of just 34,000 fish versus the 5- and 10-year average actual returns of 87,000 and 105,000, respectively. Snake River wild “B” steelhead returns are the most imperiled, with a forecast of just 1,100 fish.

With returns of steelhead so low, another strategy is to not target them and focus on other species, including warmwater species such as bass, walleye, and pikeminnow. These species are not only fun to catch but they also prey on juvenile steelhead and salmon.

To see which mountain lakes are stocked with trout, please refer to ODFW's on-line [Trout Stocking Schedule](#), which lists past releases by year and species. Anglers should bear in mind it takes two years from release to reach “catchable” or “legal” sizes, and factor that into fishing plans.


