Club Meetings



On Thursday, March 16, the Sunriver Anglers would like to invite all to their monthly meeting at the SHARC at 7pm. This month's speaker will be **Craig Schuhmann, owner of Guided Waters Fly Fishing guide service**. Craig lives in Klamath Falls, and guides mainly on the Williamson and Wood Rivers, and the surrounding waters. An easy hour and a half drive south on Highway 97, will bring you to Collier Memorial State Park. This park is a great base camp for fishing these two rivers. The Williamson actually flows along the border of the park.

Most of Craig's guiding occurs on the lower Williamson River and is concentrated on catching large migratory Upper Klamath Lake Redband Trout which has genetic links to steelhead. Average catches range from 4-7 pounds with 10 pound (30 inch) fish not uncommon. Come listen and learn about the famous Hex hatch.

The Hexagenia (large yellow mayfly) fly pattern may be the largest dry fly you will ever cast. It feels like you are casting a ping pong ball. You need to plan on being on the water late, because the hatch arrives at dusk. During the day, streamer fishing is by far the most productive method of catching these large predators. Use full sinking lines and streamers such as seal bugs and leaches for good success.

Craig has written multiple books on fly fishing. In 2006, he began his career in writing, creating a book for Moon Outdoors titled Oregon Fishing. He used his many years on the water to help the reader be a successful fisherman in Oregon. He offers helpful advice on enviro-friendly fishing methods, and includes information for disabled fishers and first-timers with some useful strategies.

In 2012, he added a second book titled "Get Started Fly Fishing", and a third book in 2016 titled "40 Great American Trout Flies". These last two books were in collaboration with another Williamson River guide, Marlon Rampy, who contributed the photographs. Craig has also contributed to many Pacific Northwest fly fishing magazines. He currently is the editor for "Flyfishing and Tying Journal".

In last month's article we reported that Sunriver has the Fly Tyer of the Year for the Oregon Council of the Federation of Fly Fishers in our community. Unfortunately we printed the wrong name. John Olschewsky, co-owner of the Hook Fly Shop has been awarded this honor. It is quite a privilege to have a tyer of this ability in our community.

Fishing season will soon be upon us. Join the anglers at the meeting and hear about

upcoming events and fishing outings. We will have a great speaker that all will enjoy.

Board Actions March 7 meeting – Approved donation of \$500 to ODF&W for Blackwater Trout eggs. Approved \$200 budget to obtain raffle items to upgrade the raffle. Received 50 books on introduction to fly fishing for kids, funded by donations. Approved increased limits at no cost on liability insurance. Approved new liability release form with one board member objecting for use at Free Youth Fishing Day. For the Holiday party, looking at Crosswater Club and SHARC and dropped the Resort option. Approved Jerry Hubbard at Secretary for 2017. Next Board meeting is May 9.

Updates on Local Waters-

Wickiup Reservoir: Wickiup has a capacity of 200,000 acre feet and is currently 81% full at 162,000 acre feet. Forecasts are that it will fill to 175,000 acre feet by irrigation season, and that it will be drawn down to 15-20,000 acre feet by Fall. Fishermen should consider the effects of the extremely low late Summer and Fall levels and to try to minimize their impact on Fall spawning activities and survival of released fish. If you would like to see the closure above the Twin Lakes launch ramp reinstated to protect spawning Kokanee and Brown Trout as well as naturally reproducing rainbows seeking cooler water, please contact the ODFW Commissioners at odfw.commission@state.or.us

Upper Deschutes Flow Ramp-up: This is the current plan to ramp-up flows out of Wickiup. The irrigation flow ramp-up dates are subject to change, depending on how hot or cold, wet or dry it is this Spring.

March 15th: Flows will increase from the current 100 cfs to 600 cfs by March 31st. This is to inundate riparian areas for Oregon Spotted Frog (OSF) spawning per last year's lawsuit Settlement Agreement. The plan is to hold at 600 cfs 'til the irrigation ramp-up begins. There was frog spawning activity at these flow levels and timing in 2016.

April 15th: is the approximate start date for North Unit Irrigation District (NUID) to ramp-up flows for irrigation season.

October: The Fall ramp-down to 100 cfs will begin around mid-month.

Crane Prairie Reservoir: Crane Prairie has a capacity of 55,000 acre feet and is currently 76% full at 42,000 acre feet.

3-9 thru 7-14: Crane is slowly increasing to 45,000 - 55,000 acre feet. It will be held at that level thru mid-July for Oregon Spotted Frog (OSF) spawning and rearing. This is to protect OSF eggs and tadpoles from being stranded by rapidly falling water levels per the Settlement Agreement.

7-15: Irrigation District storage water can be released from Crane into Wickiup until Crane falls to 35,000 acre feet where it will be held 'til the end of irrigation season. The releases are less than the Districts storage rights and are also part of the Settlement Agreement. As Crane drops to 35,000 acre feet, the levels will look similar to those of 2016. Fisherman may need to adjust their tactics and locations to account for (1) cold water inflows from the Deschutes, Cultus, and Quinn Rivers dispersing differently than they did prior to 2016, (2) the deeper water being cooler across the flats, and (3) the timing of weed growth and hatches changing due to both of the above. As always, take great care when releasing Cranebows, especially as surface temps climb above 60 degrees.

There is very little oxygen in 70 degree+ surface water, so attempting to revive fish in the top two feet of the water column often leads to delayed deaths even when the fish swim away "strong". It's best to revive them well below the surface using a long handled net and taking the time to insure that they are stable and fully recovered.

October: Crane will again slowly begin to fill to the 45,000 - 55,000 acre feet level.

Sunriver Angler's Fly Tying Corner - Lion's Mane Damsel



I like the damsel hatch. It occurs mid-day on most of our local lakes in later June and is characterized by a very splashy rise form as trout take damsels swimming just below the surface film. Damsels look to find sticks, tules, anchor ropes, or any other object that enables them to crawl out of the water to hatch. They often swim just below the surface for some distance looking for these items latch onto. It is during this surface swimming action that the damsel is the most vulnerable to trout.

The damsel nymph coloration matches the color of the environment that these insects live, which ranges from tan to a deep olive.

This month's pattern is the Lion's Mane Damsel, which is a pattern that I have used with good success casting towards rise forms and/or surface structure. It is stripped back in short strips on a dry line fishing the fly very shallow under the surface film. The name Lion's Mane Damsel is attributable to the wound marabou around the eyes that give the fly its characteristic lion's mane look. Offer long pauses during the retrieve.

Trout will often take during these pauses. The design of the Lion's Mane Damsel is simple; it features a long wispy tail to mimic the undulating motion of the natural. As you can see in the picture above, the tail contains a small drop of UV resin, which offers a hinge point on the tail and can help further the swimming motion of the natural. Give the following pattern recipe a try during your early summer damsel hatches on a favorite local lake.

Lion's Mane Damsel Pattern Recipe:

Hook:	TMC 5212 size 10-12 or similar
Thread:	Olive Brown to match Marabou
Abdomen:	Tan to Olive Marabou with very long fibers
Rib:	Red or Copper Wire
Thorax:	Olive Brown to match Marabou

Eyes: Black Plastic Bead Chain Eyes

ODF&W- is looking for help stocking Chinook salmon fry and smolts in the upper Metolius and Whychus creek. If you are interested please contact Terry Schrader, (541) 325-5347 or terry.m.shrader@state.or.us This is the note from Terry- Metolius stocking will be limited due to access problems and will likely just require a very short hike through the snow (at most ¼ mile) to stock using chest waders. Whychus Creek

stocking will depend on whether you're helping with the Alder Creek hike-in/backpack or at Camp Polk or the USFS rehabilitation site above Sisters. Alder Creek requires the stamina for ~5 mile round-trip hike with a backpack carrying 30 lbs of fish and water down a fairly steep trail. You'll need sturdy hiking boots, a backpack big enough to carry a 5-gallon bucket sized bag of fish, and a pocket knife to cut the plastic bag. If you wish to help stock fry at Camp Polk or the USFS site, you'll need a pair of waders or hip boots. Please help if you can.


